Aims

Wildridings Primary School believes that a consistent school uniform policy is vital to promote the ethos of the school and provide a sense of belonging and identity for all pupils, regardless of their protected characteristics or socio-economic circumstances. The school will also ensure that its school uniform is affordable and accessible to all pupils, and does not place an unreasonable financial burden on parents, whilst also ensuring that second hand uniform is accessible to parents regularly. The school will assess the overall cost implications of its Uniform Policy, including prior to making any changes to the school uniform. When evaluating whether costs are reasonable and proportionate, the school will consider the opinions and situations of:

- Parents with multiple children who are, or will be in the future, pupils at the school
- Parents of younger children, as they are likely to grow quickly and require new sets of uniform more frequently.
- Parents of pupils with protected characteristics that may impact their ability to access the uniform.
- Economically disadvantaged parents
- Children Looked After and Previous Children Looked After

The policy is also in line with the 'DFE Costs of School Uniforms Statutory Guidance November 2021 together with the non-statutory School Uniforms Guidance November 2021 which aims to ensure uniform is affordable and provides the best value for money for both the school and pupils' families.

Equality, Diversity, & Inclusion

The school takes its legal obligation to avoid unlawfully discriminating against any protected characteristic very seriously. All children have equal access to wearing school uniform and this policy will be applied fairly to all children regardless of their culture, race, religion, gender or ability. This policy, and the uniform standards within it, is aligned with all other school policies, including our equality policy, and allows for individual sets of circumstances of all groups and individuals. The school will aim to ensure that its uniform policy is as inclusive as possible so that all pupils can access a school uniform which is comfortable, suitable for their needs, and reflects who they are, while avoiding any direct or indirect discrimination on the basis of protected characteristics or socio-economic status. However, if a child has a diagnosed need that means it is challenging to adhere to all elements of the policy, then please arrange a meeting with the Special Educational Needs Co-Ordinator or Headteacher in order to discuss this further.

Our uniform

- White blouse/shirt or polo shirt
- Black or grey trousers / skirt / pinafore dress / culottes
- Red sweatshirt / cardigan
- (Summer – black or grey shorts / red and white summer dresses)
- White or grey socks or grey tights – short white socks for PE
- Black leather school shoes (with low heels) should be worn. Please ensure that younger children are able to manage the fastenings independently, as this will help teachers when children are changing for PE.
- For PE and Games, the children require trainers, shorts (black), a white T-Shirt and a named bag to keep them. (A PE hoodie is optional).
- For Key stage 2 children playing matches and attending training sessions, a tracksuit is desirable, especially during the winter months.

Plain uniform adhering to the guidelines detailed above is available from a range of high street and online retailers.

Please mark every item of clothing with your child's name, we can then return it to the owner without delay. Personal effects and belongings are not covered by insurance in school. There is a large basket in the library area where any unnamed items are left, which is always the first place to look if your child has lost something.

Jewellery

As a general rule, unless for medical or religious reasons, jewellery i.e. rings, necklaces and bracelets should not be worn. If ears are pierced, earrings should be a small stud in plain gold or silver or an earring with a plain stone, but these must be removed where possible for PE and games. A small box is useful for these to be stored in their drawer. Children who are not able to remove earrings (as these may be newly pierced) will be asked to tape their ears for PE. The tape **MUST** be provided by the child. Newly pierced ears can take a period of up to six weeks before sleepers and studs can be safely removed. We remind parents that ears should be pierced at the start of the summer holidays to allow sufficient healing time.

The school will not accept responsibility for any accidents caused by wearing of earrings and other jewellery on the school premises.

Children are encouraged to wear analogue or digital watches in order to support their learning of telling the time. However, any type of smart watch is not permitted due to the ability to take photographs or be directly linked to mobile phones which poses a safeguarding risk.

No nail varnish, temporary tattoos or make-up may be worn to school.

Hairstyles

Hair should always be of a natural colour and worn neatly. If longer than collar length, hair should be fully tied back with a suitable neutral band or head band in red or white. All hair accessories (ties, clips or bows) must be plain, red, black or white whilst also being appropriately sized.

Multi-coloured or beaded hair is not permitted, unless for ethnic, religious or other reasons that are specific for your child, the specifics of which need to be discussed with your child's class teacher. Long fringes covering the eyes, mohicans/mohawks, tramlines or patterns cut into the hair, or cuts shorter than a grade 1 are not permitted. If hair is covered for religious or cultural reasons, the material should be in either plain red, black or white in colour without embellishments.

Implementation of the Uniform Policy

Staff are responsible for:

- Ensuring that pupils dress in accordance with this policy at all times.
- Ensuring that the children are wearing the correct uniform and offering support/guidance if they are not.
- Ensuring that pupils understand why having a consistent and practical school uniform is important, e.g. school identity/part of a team/promoting pride/self-confidence, and a feeling of belonging within the school community.
- Set a good example in terms of dress and personal appearance.
- Acknowledge that they serve the local community as a set of professionals.

Parents / guardians are responsible for making sure that:

- Their children come to school in full uniform every day

- Their children adhere to the school's uniform policy.
- Their child's uniform is clean, presentable and appropriately sized.
- Their children are provided with the correct school uniform as detailed in this policy (unless there are special circumstances such as non-uniform days or other exceptional reasons which have been discussed with the Senior Leadership Team).
- A discussion takes place with the Headteacher if their child requires an exemption to the uniform rules for a period of time in order to explain why.
- All uniform is labelled correctly and clearly.
- The school is informed if there is a medical or religious reason which prevents their child adhering to this policy
- A discussion takes place with school if they need any support with providing their child with school uniform.

Pupils are responsible for:

- Wearing the correct uniform at all times (unless an agreed exemption is in place).
- Looking after their uniform as appropriate.
- Understanding and respecting why a school uniform is important to the school, e.g. school identity and community.

The role of the Governing Body

The Governing Body supports the school in implementing the Uniform Policy. It will consider all representations from parents/carers regarding this policy and liaise with the Headteacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity. It is the Governing Body's responsibility to regularly review this policy and ensure that the Uniform Policy helps children to dress sensibly, in clothing that is safe and practical. The Governing Body is also responsible for ensuring that the school uniform meets all national regulations concerning equality.

Adherence to the Uniform Policy

1) Class teachers will speak to any children who do not wear the correct uniform to understand why. If a child is wearing clothes that do not adhere to this school uniform policy, their parents will be spoken to at the end of the school day or emailed asking if there is any reason why their child isn't wearing the correct uniform and if any support can be provided. Parents will subsequently be informed that if the child wears the incorrect uniform the following day, the correct uniform (where possible) will be provided.

2) If a child wears the incorrect uniform the following day, school will provide (where possible) the correct uniform for them to wear for that day.

3) If children continually attend school wearing clothing which does not adhere to the uniform policy, they will be referred to a member of the Senior Leadership Team, who will speak to the child in order to try to understand what the barriers are whilst also being mindful that this may not be the child's fault. This member of the Senior Leadership Team will subsequently speak to the parents of the child concerned in order to understand why their child isn't wearing the correct uniform and if any support can be provided.

4) A member of the Senior Leadership Team may discipline a child for a serious or consistent breach of the school's uniform policy if it is the child making these choices rather than the parents. This will be dealt with on a case by case situation as it may not be the child's fault for wearing the incorrect uniform. A meeting will be offered to the parents to further understand what the barrier is for their child not wearing school uniform and if any support is required. The child will be provided with the correct school uniform.

Changes to School Uniform Policy

The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are serious reasons, for example on religious grounds, why parents want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will look sympathetically at such requests which must be made in writing to the Headteacher. If any parent would like the school to modify the uniform policy, they should make representation, in the first instance, to the Headteacher.
